## The Blessings of Mayim Rabim

One of my favorite stories in the Torah is of Yitro, Moses's father-in-law, who pays a visit to Moses and observes him going about his business (Exodus 18). Yitro offers sage advice to Moses to help Moses grow as a leader. Yitro is an example for all of us of the insight that can be gained by consulting with a trusted advisor. Sometimes it's invaluable to have the perceptions of an outsider. Why else would people seek feedback from consultants, therapists, clergy or coaches?

Members of Mayim Rabim were fortunate to be visited by a wise advisor at the end of April. We met with Rabbi Mordechai Liebling at the home of Barbara and Bruce Nordstrom-Loeb. Rabbi Liebling is the Director of the Social Justice Organizing Program at RRC [Reconstructionist Rabbinical College] and former Executive Director of the Jewish Reconstructionist Federation. During this powerful session, Rabbi Liebling had us reflect on the strengths we have as a congregation.

Individuals shared how they love the community, enjoy services, cherish the intimacy and treasure the way we care about one another. People spoke about deriving intellectual stimulation from our programs and feeling shared values with one another. Our small size was also seen as a plus.

Rabbi Liebling challenged us by asking what we want others to feel when they walk into Mayim Rabim. We heard the aspirations that newcomers would be welcomed and inspired. We were also asked what we hoped they would feel when they left. What would they walk out with that they didn't know before? Rabbi Liebling encouraged us to consider that during High Holiday services everybody is part of the membership committee. He encouraged everybody to reach past his or her comfort zone and speak to a person they do not know.

As a result of this meeting, members were energized to focus on how we will grow based on our current strengths. We recognize the blessings of Mayim Rabim when we focus on our community, our small size that allows for intimacy, our adult education programming, and the availability of our Rabbi.

Lest we get too complacent, Rabbi Liebling cautioned us to take great care when a new member joins. He likened the new member's initial period with our congregation to the engagement phase of a serious relationship. More courtship needs to ensue to solidify the marriage.

Most of all, we left with an affirmation of who we are as a community and renewed energy to focus on growing.

## **Mayim Rabim Board – Minutes Tuesday, March 24, 2015**

Members in attendance: Denise, Celia, Sandra, Sydne, and Larry.

The Board appointed Patty Diamond as the chair of the Youth Programs Committee.

The Elections Committee reported that the ballot is just about ready to be sent to the membership. The ballot will include language regarding the rabbi contract along with one candidate running for the Board.

The Rabbi Rehire Committee reported on the ongoing contract negotiations with Rabbi Stiefel.

The Finance Committee reviewed the current budget.

The Ritual Committee is looking for volunteers to lead or participate in services, as well as read Torah.

## **Mayim Rabim Board – Minutes Wednesday, April 22, 2015**

Members in attendance: Denise, Celia, Sandra, Marc, and Larry.

The Board moved to accept Rabbi Stiefel's contract.

The Finance Committee reported that to date in this fiscal year, no funds have been taken out of the Rabbi Development Fund to balance the budget. Mayim Rabim will be increasing the dues we pay to the Reconstructionist movement in the next budget by 15%. The Finance Committee has proposed changes to the Dues Policy, formalizing our current practice. Certain revisions were suggested. The Board will continue this discussion and vote on the policy at the May Board meeting.

## **Mayim Rabim Board – Minutes Monday, May 11, 2015**

Members in attendance: Denise, Celia, Sandra, Larry, Sydne, and Helen.

Barbara Nordstrom-Loeb from the Ritual Committee and Ad Hoc Shabbat Practices Committee proposed changes to current Gay/Lesbian Congregants and Commitment Ceremonies policy and congregation Shabbat practice. The Board voted to change the language in the proposed revision of the Gay/Lesbian policy to remove "GLBTQ" references and replace the acronym with other gender and sexual orientation language. Barbara will reconfigure the policy language and bring it back to the Board. The Board voted to approve the changes to Mayim Rabim's Kashrut policy and Ritual Customs document regarding: community traditions for ritual hand washing and the Hamotzi, candle lighting during Shabbat Services, and Kashrut policy.

Sandra reported on the Plenum call with the Jewish Reconstructionist Communities. The Reconstructionist Rabbinical College is considering adjusting its policy on admitting rabbinical applicants and ordaining rabbis who have non-Jewish partners. There was also discussion of the Reconstructionist movement's budget and ways to raise revenue.

The Board began discussing the need for a policy with guidelines on outside groups using the Friends Meeting House.

The Finance Committee presented the proposed 2015-2016 budget. The Board approved the 2015-2016 budget. The Dues Policy was approved by the Board.

The Ritual Committee has service dates set for next year and these dates will be submitted to the Friends Meeting for review.

The Board discussed the need for a House Committee Chair (position is still vacant).

The Tikkun Olam Committee reported that Mayim Rabim will once again be participating in the J-PRIDE event and parade on June 28th.

## Medicine Bottles For Malawi Landfills Do Not Need Medicine Bottles!



We 'first-worlders' who use prescription medicines may find ourselves uncomfortable throwing away empty medicine bottles.

**Malawi Needs Medicine Bottles!** While we throw away perfectly good medicine bottles, medical pharmacies and hospital facilities in Malawi often find themselves with nothing except **torn pieces of paper** in which to wrap medicine for their patients. Medicine so wrapped is prey to contamination or loss and may be a dangerous attraction for curious children. Your empty bottles can help families in a third world country keep their medicines clean, out of reach of small children, and safe while they are being used.

**We can Help Malawi and Landfills:** Save used prescription containers. Remove labels: peel the peelables; put the non-peelables in boiling water until you can remove the labels and the glue. Then box or bag up a bunch and bring them to Mayim Rabim for Elaine Frankowski to deliver to a neighbor who is sending them in bulk to the Malawi project.

Either Elaine or a friend will collect them at services.


## **Update on the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College's Partner Status Policy**

The Reconstructionist Rabbinical College [RRC] is revisiting its policy barring admission or graduation of students who are married or in committed relationships with non-Jews. In stage one of the review, the faculty conducted in-depth research, reflection and discussion, after which they voted for preliminary passage of a proposal to eliminate the policy. In stage two of the RRC's values-based decision-making process, they invited various stakeholders—including congregations—to weigh in.

The dialogue around this issue revealed strong feelings on both sides. A number of congregations voiced support, others opposed the proposed policy change, and a few were divided. While intermarried households are welcomed in our Reconstructionist congregations there were concerns about changing the policy for Rabbis — concerns about historical Jewish survival, the centrality of Jewish homes and families, the Rabbi as a model for Jewish behavior, as well as the potential to alienate other movements, and fear that a change might marginalize Reconstructionism in the larger Jewish community as well as alienate members and congregations that consider this too radical a move. Arguments in support of a change include the idea of Rabbis serving as positive role models for maintaining strong Jewish practice and engaged Jewish lives and Reconstructionism's core value of inclusivity.

Various compromises were suggested: to allow a more robust interpretation of the word "ordinarily" in the policy: "The RRC does not *ordinarily* admit or graduate;" to revive the category of "ger toshav" for non-Jews who commit themselves to the community; and, to remove the intermarried prohibition but add language about maintaining a Jewish home and raising Jewish children.

RRC faculty deliberations have already taken place; a final vote will occur, tentatively, this August.
